A PASTOR'S THOUGHT

The other Sunday evening I referred to the reputed conversations between Sir Christopher Wren and some of his tradesmen when St. Paul's Cathedral was in the process of being constructed. I have just come across a variation on the same theme. In these conversations Wren in turn asked the same question of four of the workmen – WHAT IS IT YOUR DOING? The first workman responded by informing Wren that he was a bricklayer, and he was laying bricks to support his family. The second declared that he was a bricklayer and he was building a wall, and the third that he was building the support wall for the nave. It was the fourth man, in Wren's eyes, who had caught the vision of what he was doing, for when this bricklayer was asked the now familiar question, be boldly declared that he was "building a Cathedral to the glory of God".

Four men doing something of the same kind of task. Perspective is everything. I wonder how we would answer the question as to what we are doing in life -- and with life? Building - to the glory of God? Seeking to serve the Lord, with humility and sensitivity. Trying to walk the way that he has appointed for us? Being faithful to our calling in Christ Jesus?

Do you remember the word of the Lord in the 6th Chapter of Jeremiah? This is what the Lord says; "Stop at the crossroads and look around. Ask for the old godly way, and walk in it. Travel its path, and you will find rest for your souls". I feel that as a church we have once again come to a crossroads in our history. Our numbers may be low and the long term future to some may seem bleak. It is important therefore that we again seek the Lord's mind and will for us – that with his guidance we discover and travel "the old godly way". This. Of coarse mustn't be seen as an excuse on our part for living in the past and being satisfied with the present. The way ahead must be God's way - "the old godly way ". But God's way may well lead us along new avenues and allow us to enjoy deeper experiences of His love and grace. And in God's will - the best may yet to be - for us as individuals and for us collectively as a fellowship of God's people living as we do at the beginning of the 21st Century in an area that desperately needs to be challenged by the power of the Gospel.


