

B.M.S. LINK MISSIONARY NEWS (rec'd 15 May 2011)

Dear Friends,

As the UK heads towards summer, here in Angola we are moving into winter and the temperature is dropping in the evenings although it is still hot during the day. We are three months into the new PEPE year and I have started teaching at the Seminary. There are lots of things to thank and praise God for and other things I would really like you to pray about.

We have about 700 children in PEPE this year and several Pastors interested in PEPE for next year. The reduction in numbers is due to some PEPEs not reopening due to lack of space or teachers. PEPE has started in Baia Farta with 50 children and more that would like to come along, but there is not sufficient space and we need to see how they get on with two classes before starting any more. Manuel visited Lubango and Benguela last week and saw the children at Baia Farta. He also had meetings with Pastors and Missionary Educators, continuing to explain how PEPE works and suggesting what they could do to support their own PEPEs. One of Manuel's strengths is speaking and explaining PEPE to Pastors and church leaders, getting them more on board. However, as I've just done the 3 monthly accounts for PEPE, I see that one of his weaknesses is overspending on these visits. He has nearly used up the budget for visits for the year and we are only in May!

I've spoken to him about this before but we need to have a really serious talk about it and I would value your prayers for this. A lot is due to cultural issues, but we need to work with in our budgets or we jeopardise PEPE.

Three times a week I teach the first year students at our churches seminary. There are only six students in the class and we are getting to know each other quite well. I teach English, Islam and PEPE. We were



learning about the structure and running of PEPE last week and they had lots of questions and some good ideas about what we should be doing to let others know about PEPE. I was really encouraged as the penny seems to have dropped with some of them in regard to PEPE being a ministry that benefits the community and provides the church with an avenue to reach out and evangelise. The church schools are often seen as a way of making money for the church, PEPE is different and requires the church to give. It was good to see the students getting that.

I've been finding the classes on Islam a blessing. As I learn more about the Muslim faith I am valuing ever more what we have in Jesus. In class, the topic has opened up discussion on what Christians believe and why, as we learn what Muslims believe. I was really pleased to discover that some of the students have had faith sharing conversations with Muslims. As Angola is opening up more, there is a growing number of Muslims in the country and they have missionary zeal. Mosques are being built and employment offered, which attracts people. The church recognises the need to be equipped to respond. We have an English club that was supposed to be a conversation class but there is such a wide ability range that we can't really have a club and it's turned into lessons. It reminds me of my days teaching English in Madeira, and I realise I am quite rusty after a twelve year break. I also hear my Scottish accent coming back to me as we drill phrases, it's really funny. The seminary is on the other side of the city. I share a driver with my colleague Fiona



so I often have to drive myself there. Pray for safety in travel and energy as it is really tiring heading there in the afternoons and getting home late. It should get less tiring as the temperature drops.

Only two weeks to go and Fiona and I head to Mozambique to help the Holders, new BMS workers, settle in. We are having a week's holiday in Cape Town en route and I feel I need a break away to relax. Praise God we have our visas for Mozambique. It only took two days once we had all the documentation. Pray that all would go smoothly and we would enable the Holders to have an easier start in Beira. Pray we would get them into language lessons, be able to buy the things required for their home and make good contacts for them to have friends there.

We have been meeting with Carlotta every Friday morning as we prepare for starting Bible Study. Carlotta is in her early twenties, finished studying and looking for a job. In the meantime she is keen to serve God in leading Bible Study at church and I've been enjoying getting to know her and trying to answer some of her questions. This week it was a question about why we should study the Old Testament if there is a new covenant with Jesus in the New. Last week it was where the different races came from if we are all descended from Noah, so it's keeping us on our toes. The plan is to start the Bible study group in September, once we are back from Mozambique and Carlotta is well prepared. Then she can lead the group when we aren't able to be there.

Well, I'm heading off to church now and thinking of you as you meet to praise God on Sunday. The services will be different but we'll be worshipping the same God.

Dear all,

Greetings from Thailand!

It has been great being back in my home country and seeing family and friends. I arrived safely on the 28th April and stayed with my parents for three days before leaving them to start my research trip in Bangkok and South Thailand.

It is so hot in Thailand as it is now summer, but it rains nearly every evening which is very unusual. My interviews have been going well and so far I have interviewed ten people.

I have collected good information from the interviews and at the same time I have learnt so much from talking and interviewing various people from different backgrounds. Praise God for his goodness as all interviewees were



so kind and very open with me. Whether they were scholars or villagers, they all were willing to answer my questions openly and I had a lot of fun and sometimes shed some tears as I listened to many touching stories. Praise God also for his wisdom as he guided me to the right people to interview, this is very important for my research trip and dissertation.

I am scheduled to interview another six people they will be – Muslim background believers, Islamic teachers, a Quranic translator and Biblical scholars. Please continue pray for me for God's guidance and wisdom before, during and after interviews. Currently I am feeling very tired because of the heat, lots of travelling and the tight schedule. Please pray that God would strengthen me during the remainder of my research trip and comfort us (Graham and I) as we are apart. I am also looking forward to seeing my parents again and I plan to have a wee holiday with my friend before I return to Scotland.
